



ANDREA DU CHATENIER



Andrea du Chatenier is a sculptor turned ceramicist from Kirikiriroa/Hamilton. She completed a Certificate in Craft Design at the Waikato Institute of Technology, a Bachelor of Fine Arts at Auckland University, and a Master of Fine Arts at RMIT, Melbourne, Australia. Andrea has received numerous grants and awards for her accomplished and challenging work, including selection for the Sao Paulo Biennale, the Wallace Arts Trust Vermont Award, and the Portage Ceramics Residency award at Guldagergaard, Denmark. In 2022 Andrea was awarded the Blumhardt Foundation Gift for her contribution to New Zealand Craft. After completing the Tylee Cottage Artist Residency at the Sarjeant Gallery Andrea set up her studio in Whanganui. Andrea is a respected academic and has spent many years lecturing in art and design. She currently teaches at UCOL in Whanganui.



1. Beatrice Carlson / Panukaiki Ring \$550.00 / Scoria-Volcanic rock NZ, Sterling silver -sculpture on lost wax

A ring sculpture repositions scale: what was an intimate sculpture is a statement ring.


It also changes perception of things: by wearing a sculpture it becomes part of ourselves, country, ancestry.

It changes notion of value: the Scoria, the volcanic stone is precious in representing what matters really.



2. Elliot Collins / Midnight brawl under street lamps (you gotta keep shining) \$2,200.00 / Glass beads on found wood

This work displays a compulsion to make within a practice hindered by provincial limitations and parochial attitudes. Made in the small hours at the end of a workday, this driftwood is elevated to an almost jewel-encrusted state, hovering above the disharmony yet knowing its history and connection to home.



3. Sandra Howlett / Spill the Tea - On a Precipice \$250.00 / Mixed Media (Tea cup, digital componentry, model figures, impasto, tissue, acrylic paint)

A commentary on the need to take time, a breather, and have an urgent conversation about the physical and social contagion arising from our digital and technological relationship with the environment. What future are we leaving for our children?



4. Z Snook / All That's Wrong.... \$930.00 / Sculpture - ceramic

Precarious. Temporary. Tenuous. Too much and too little. Human existence in the third millennium.

5. Christine Cousineau / Superior orders 2023 \$1,800.00 / Sculpture

This artwork is made by a multidisciplinary artist whose latest work focuses mainly on clay and bronze casting anthropomorphic sculptures. Inspiration comes from nature and human nature. This sculpture, Superior orders 2023, depicts 2 military soldiers having a conversation about the credibility gap of the superior orders.



6. Becky Richards / Nest of the Blue-tipped Bamboozler \$1,500.00 / Sculpture

Diaries of early desert dwellers recorded sightings of an elusive creature, glimpsed only as a flash of aquamarine plumage. Clay-like nests were recovered from these areas - containing egg clutches bizarre in their variance of size, shape and colour. Omitted from natural history records, the Bluetipped Bamboozler remains a mystery.



7. Deborah Crowe / Graft: Bouquet & Co \$650.00 / Mixed media: found objects, paint, acrylic, dried leaves, paper, textiles.

Exploring links between creativity, play, assemblage and delight from arranging objects; this work explores systems of decoration and display. Constructed from found and fabricated components the arrangement and setting are placed to accommodate contradiction. While making this work balance, tension and gravity danced in carefully considered (sometimes) shonky alliances.



8. Susan Nelson / Hestia II \$1,265.00 / Reclaimed timber, human hair, clay, brass

Hestia-II is part of a series exploring the unholy trinity (body, shadow, emotions) celebrating a balanced self, warts and all, rather than constantly striving for unsustainable idealised expectations. Goddess of hearth and home, Hestia represents our inner archetype that nourishes and keeps the warm fires burning when it matters most.



9. Sylvia Sinel / Study III - Balance act \$1,250.00 / Sculpture (polystyrene, plastic, nylon, aluminium & wood)

Materiality, testing and trying, curiosity, exploration and play, walking on wire, Balance act, Burning desire to make, Make and make, everlong obsession, observing shape, line and form, Breaking point, What is it and what's the point? Who the heck knows.



10. Kathryn Bartlett / Loss \$2,200.00 / Cast Crystal Glass

This sculpture is a very personal response to the special bond that exists between humans and their pets, and to the profound affect their loss has on our lives.



11. Johnathan Lovering / Abyss \$2,500.00 / Sculpture (wood ,plastic,glue,oil based paint)

Abyss is a small study into the theme of the unknown through the counter balancing of opposing tensions within a loosely figurative context. The play between media and the sense of order imposed through process play a key role in this discussion on tensions and balance.



12. Robyn Gibson / Press for Self Congratulations \$1,200.00 / Found object, wooden box, springs, plastic hands, electronic mechanism, batteries, paint

Press for Self Congratulations, a humorous view of the artists as self critic in regard to the processes of art making, finishing and selection.



13. Virginia Henderson / A Windy Day On Pakiri Beach \$725.00 / Ceramic Porcelain Sculpture, thrown , altered and glazed

Anticipation of a welcome breeze with weighty roll of waves on sand. Marking traces of abandoned castles, scattered remnants tumble by along paths of walks cut short.



14. Anna Campbell / Workshop #2 \$1,050.00 / Glazed earthenware and stoneware. Wooden box.

This work is inspired by still life painting. I have been working on industrial style still life compositions based on my workshop space. I am trying to capture the randomness of a functioning studio as opposed to the carefully curated shelves that might line your living room.



15. Franke Heidecke / NaCl \$480.00 / Mixed: wild clay, slip, paint

Magnificence through magnification. Inspired by the beauty of a grain of salt, one of the building blocks of life, seen through an electron microscope.



16. Andrew Rankin / Vivid succession \$4,500.00 / Recycled Totara, French polished, bent plexiglass.

The work holds a succession of compositional possibilities as it leads the viewer around the artwork, exploring form, volume and material. Leaving the backing paper on the inside of the plexiglass acts as a black mirror, reflecting the forms, the viewer in situ and the totara, providing image in frame.



17. Ainsley O'Connell / Shibam \$1,400.00 / Sculpture - cast plaster

My art practice investigates how objects are perceived and comprehended. Themes of displacement, inversion, scale and materiality substitutions are explored to disrupt the object's initial aura and understanding. The resulting artworks aim to create new conceptual possibilities that challenge viewers' preconceptions regarding the works presented and their origins.



18. Ben Pearce / Lunar Shift \$3,250.00 / Carved aluminium

Lunar shift is the artists old coffee pot but carved into the surface of the moon to suggest a state of mind. The work could be seen as a future relic or lost article from a space journey.



19. Volker Hawighorst / Square Rune C1 \$1,450.00 / Wall hanging Sculpture

Transformation of a mundane, 2nd hand object into something new by overlaying different grids and patterns.



20. Chauncey Flay / Diapir VIII \$8,500.00 / Stone, Glass.


Diapir refers to a subterranean geological force in which one material conforms to the shape of a harder material through pressure and heat.



23. Louise McRae / Red \$2,800.00 / Sculpture

Making a work, living a life, in parallel. Much is not as it seems. Messing with the order of how to make a thing, tied to the joy of material is a way for me to seek a truth.



24. Aidan Raill / Holding it together \$250.00 / Ceramic

Holding it together plays with the movement between the drawn line and the physical lines that form the structure of the piece.



25. Sarah Urwin / Tearing at the seams \$550.00 / Clay

Tearing at the seams is created from five different locally sourced clays on a black clay base. It dives into realms of chaos and calmness of repetition.



26. Stuart Bridson / hello \$1,200.00 / Sculpture

"As a sculpture I feel quite shy, humans look at me thinking they can see me, but they are often confused by the surrounding information. I withdraw beneath my plain exterior where it's warm and I feel protected - the sculpture.



27. lissalee / Arboretum \$150.00 / Sculpture

Arboretum - From the Arboreal Isles Collection, encapsulating boundless narratives.



28. Oliver Cain / It always finds it's way out \$2,200.00 / Ceramic sculpture with ostrich feathers

This cracked ceramic vessel represents the challenges that we all face, physical, emotional, or spiritual. The feathers represent the beauty that can arise from these challenges. Even when we feel broken and vulnerable, we still have the power to make the best of it and create something new.



29. Stephen Penny / Pōhutukawa Colour Molecule \$6,750.00 / Sculpture

A distillation of an iconic image central to our lives reduced to a simple colour memory and composition in a sculptural form. A colour memory trigger mature dark green leaf, new pale green leaf growth, bright red flower. Solid bronze, solid aluminium, patinated brass, auto paint. Edition 10, 2APs

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In order to address the serious lack of cultural development in Hamilton, the Waikato Society of Arts was founded in 1934 and through its support of artists and visual art in the Waikato it has been built on a strong foundation that has lasted for almost 90 years. Part of this mission is to nurture developing and experienced artists in their journey. Following on with this initial concept two National awards were added to the operations over the years to widen the opportunities further afield to artists in Aotearoa. Now, the inaugural Small Sculpture Awards has been added through an idea first introduced by Gaye Jurisich, who was on the WSA Executive in 2022. Gaye is an accomplished artist and sculptor herself, who has exhibited widely, both nationally and internationally. We are pleased to be having the first exhibition of 29 sculptors from throughout Aotearoa and thank Gaye for the curation of this exhibition and for initiating this award to highlight the incredible skills these artists have.
