NZPPA

The Waikato Society of Arts has been part of the Waikato landscape since 1934, as early custodians of art in the Waikato. In our 87 year history, our mission has been to promote the study of art, connect artists, and provide resources and exhibitions to support artists.

The WSA established the NZPPA initially through contact with Peter Sergell, who was involved with the Summer Arts Festival and wanted to include visual arts in their programme, Glenis du Chatenier, Graham Henry and Pam Nash approached the Vela family for support, and from there the awards have grown ever since, through many dedicated committees and volunteers. Philip and Lyn Vela supported the main prize from 2000 to 2020, and without their generosity this award would not have grown as successfully as it has and continues to do.

In 2021, we are privileged to have sponsorship from Nancy Caiger \$1000 Paint Award, Golden Homes \$2000 Paint Award, PCANZ, \$1000 Print Award, Ruth Davey \$2000 Print Award, Gordon Harris \$500 People's Choice Award and the Main Prize \$20000 – is kindly sponsored by Chow Hill \$5000, Kim Maley & Jenny Ferneyhough \$5000, Susie & Cliff Allen of Bustle \$5000, Graham & Elizabeth Robinson \$5000, Jane Finch towards Operating costs and Fusion Print for all our Printing costs.

This year the awards are back at the Hamilton Gardens, Pavilion after two successful years partnering with Wintec in their spacious atrium venue. The judge, Dr Ed Hanfling, is originally from Hamilton and NZPPA is excited to bring his skills to this major platform in New Zealand art. His research encompasses activities within and between the disciplines of art history and art criticism. He has published books and articles on modernist abstract art in NZ and internationally (particularly on Milan Mekusich, Roy Good, Mervyn Williams and Morris Louis), and his writings also investigate theories and issues of judgement, value and canon. He contributes regular reviews and articles, and has written extensively, incatalogues and books, on the work of NZ painter Ian Scott and printmaker Anthony Davies. De Hanfling is currently a lecturer in art history and theory, Dunedin School of Art, Otago Polytechnic.



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

WSA History

We thought it would be nice to put little excerpts into our monthly newsletter about the history of the WSA. The excerpt below is from 'Moves Afoot - A supplementary history of the WSA 1983-2009' by Megan Lyon

The Waikato Society of Arts (WSA) has been a significant part of Hamilton's cultural, historical and community make-up since it's inception on 14th August 1934. This was the result of a public meeting convened by two Hamilton artists, Ida Carey and Adeline Younghusband and Dr 'Tim' Rogers, who believed the 'arts should be the heart of life of every town, as a vehicle for the expression of humanity and morality'.



Part 8: The Art Awards

National Contemporary Art Awards (NCAA)

WSA began the National Contemporary Art Awards (NCAA) in 2000. The award has been supported by Trust Waikato as its naming rights sponsor. The Waikato museum plays host to the awards and, as of 2010, will manage the awards alone. The NCAA is regarded as one of 'New Zealand's premier contemporary art events. It has put Hamilton on the map by refusing to shy away from controversry and promoting debate about what is fresh and innovative in art.'

The awards have positioned the WSA on a national contemporary art stage with nationwide curators, judges and entrants and their development was a significant move for an art society. Wellington collectors Jim and Mary Barr judged the second NCAA and at the time Jim Barr commented 'There's a lot of art societies that just keep on showing the same sort of thing over and over again....They dont really progress - you could be in the 1950's still. This is very much a 2001 exhibition, there's no doubt about that.'

Attention Printmakers!

WAIPRINT 2021, the annual exhibition by the printmakers of the WSA, is 10 September— 11 October, so time to start thinking about what prints you'll submit. The entry form is included in this newsletter.

Our guest artist this year is our own Gemma Reid, who tutors several classes in the WSA Art School. In 'Points of Viewing' her collagraphs examine the unique quality of light found in Aotearoa and how the interplay of light and shadow reveal the rich architecture of the Waikato region.

'Print Outside the Box', Gemma's WAIPRINT workshop, will involve pushing print into three dimensions and will be suitable for both experienced printmakers and total newbies. Learn how to make a collagraph or drypoint print and then transform it into a free-standing object. This is a two-day workshop, 18 and 19 September.




Image: Grocotts Buildings - Kirikiriroa, collagraph, Gemma Reid, 2021

Three cheers for Women Painters 8 Berthe Morisot (1841 ~ 1895)

In recent years Berthe has been re-appraised as not just the "feminine impressionist with a light touch" but at the cutting edge who was bold enough to explore the colour of light and take it to another level. In this way she was a leader and should be recognized as such. Her self portrait is shown here.



It was a dicey thing in those days to be found painting outdoors, unchaperoned as a woman, as it was not what respectable women did. Tut tut. Berthe mainly limited her oeuvre to domestic scenes of family members. So this work "Summer's Day" is one of the few that she completed out doors.

If we look closely we might see anxiety in the face of the model she had posing.

Berthe is much influenced by her famous tutor's colour sense (Corot) with the cool blues, silvery greens. She also broke the impressionists rule of no earth colours!

GRAND NARRATIVES & MYTHOLOGIES IN THE WESTERN TRADITION

Offered: 2021 Term 3. Eight consecutive sessions per Term. First class meets Wednesdays beginning 4 August 2021, 6:30-8:30pm (tea break incl.), and the last class meets on Wednesday 22 September 2021.

Location: Berkley Intermediate School, Hillcrest, Hamilton. Distance learning options are available for this course.

Have you ever wondered what the grand old narratives and myths of the Odyssey, Exodus or the Arthurian legends are all about but never had the time to study them? This course offers the opportunity to find out more!

Some great narratives and mythologies have strongly influenced the self-construction and imagination of the West. These include legendary stories and mythologies of the Bible, ancient Greek and Roman narratives, as well as Celtic, Germanic and Slavic mythologies.

In this eight-week course we'll read and discuss some of the core texts of the Western mythological tradition together. Based on a few exemplary texts, we'll also look at later up-takes of mythological elements and the long-term effects of these narratives, which sometimes endure to the present day, especially in contemporary novels, films and art work, for example.

Applying close and critical reading, we will try to understand which fundamental philosophical, religious and historical questions the mythology is addressing. Additionally, we'll discuss why myths and narratives have come to be considered seminal, which narratives have gained global appeal, and what they may still mean to us today. Finally, we'll consider how the texts contributed to the construction of a 'Western' tradition and what possible parallels there may be with other, non-Western stories.

This eight-week course provides a detailed introduction to the Western mythological tradition. You will be expected to do some pre-class reading each week of the short texts and stories. Class sessions are taught seminar style, with each class introduced with a talk, followed by a close and critical reading of the texts, and group discussion and reflection.
