Welcome to the Waikato Society of Arts December newsletter

As you may have read we have taken up the opportunity to run the ArtsPost galleries and retail space. The date for this to happen is now the 17th of January, 2024. ArtsPost will be closed over the Christmas period and then while we settle in and work through the retail space and art for sale. The Art School will re-open on the 22nd of January 2024 for the School Holiday Programme. The building will always be known as ArtsPost due to its history but the operations within the building will be run by WSA. To celebrate this next milestone and our 90th year we will be having a soft Opening on the 1st of February for our members, tutors and sponsors to attend. We will send out an invitation with the finer details and please keep this date circled on your calendar. We would love to see you all there and are looking forward to the full calendar of exhibitors for 2024.

As part of the restructure for the WSA we need volunteers to help at blue gallery with sitting while an exhibition is on. This can be weekly, fortnightly, monthly, annually, whatever you can do as part of the WSA family. If you have a spare few hours to help we would love to book you in so we can plan our 2024 year and help the artists that are all booked in to exhibit, to have successful exhibitions and sales.

December workshops are online now and we are lucky to have Sybille running a Mokuhanga-Japanese woodcut weekend workshop. This workshop does not happen often so try to take advantage of Sybille's training in Japan by Masters in this ancient method before the class fills up. Another weekend workshop being offered in December is Anya's Teen Sculpting class. These have proved very popular in the past and are useful for developing your drawing skills. The enrolments are open for the January School Holiday programme and Term 1 2024 art classes. Please make sure you reply to our request to confirm your space in your existing class before we open the enrolments further.

There are a few people to thank as we lead into the Christmas period. The WSA library has been fully colour coded by Judi Graham and it looks outstanding. What an incredible job Judi has done and this is such an asset for everyone to use. Please use our library and respect the time that has been put into this when returning books to their place. It is so simple.

Our tutors at WSA are always doing such an incredible job with their lessons and students and we are grateful to have such a highly skilled team who dedicate their time each week to the WSA classes. Happy 100th Birthday to Ruth Davey!!

When Ruth and Lester Davey moved to Hamilton in 1960, one of the first things they did was join the WSA. This proved the beginning of a long and fruitful relationship with the organisation and the foundation of many art friendships and collaborations.

After first studying monoprint with Campbell Smith, she commuted to Auckland to learn more techniques, and later began to build her printmaking skills with local mentors, such as Susan (Poff) Flight in Thames. By 1973 Ruth had established printmaking classes at the WSA Art School. Through the art school she taught relief and intaglio printmaking, drawing, watercolour and papermaking.

1970 saw her first exhibition, with Campbell Smith and Irma Conroy. In 1975 she was in the International Year for Women exhibition, Eight Waikato Artists, and had her first solo exhibition in 1978 at Studio Gallery. Her WSA friends will remember her part in the annual printmaking exhibition that became Waiprint and in the popular Left Bank festivals.

Over the following years Ruth exhibited around NZ and overseas, including in the UK, where she spent two extended study periods in Cumbria and Bristol. She was a foundation member of Print Council Aotearoa NZ (established in 2000 as Central Print Council) and has been an enthusiastic participant in their workshops and exhibitions, forming many new print friendships.

Ruth continued teaching etching classes until the mid-1990s, gradually handing over to Joan Travaglia and Stan Boyle, and afterwards came along as a classmate, always happy to help out with advice or a demo.

In 2013 she was in the group exhibition at Waikato Museum: *Don't Fence Me In: Wise Waikato Women Artists* 1930s-1970s. Later that year, in time for her 90th birthday, came a retrospective exhibition at ArtsPost: *Ruth Davey: A Lifetime of Drawing and Printmaking*.

In recognition of her importance as a Waikato artist, Waikato Museum has acquired many of Ruth's prints and virtually all of her sketchbooks, dating back to the 1950s.

Since their move to Hilda Ross, the Daveys have put the remainder of Ruth's art in the stewardship of the WSA, where the prints and some drawings are available to see and to purchase. All proceeds from the sale of her work go to the Ruth Davey Merit in Printmaking Prize, awarded annually since 2020 at the New Zealand Painting and Printmaking Award.



Want to gain a valuable new skill? Come along and learn how to sculpt with polymer clay!



Whether you want to sculpt a character who has human features, is a fire breathing dragon, or is a sub-Saharan lizard, the world is your oyster (and your sculpture could be too!). It doesn't necessarily have to be a character; you could sculpt any kind of object.

Sculpting with polymer clay is a fun way to relax and let your creativity loose. You can achieve an intricate level of detail, using a variety of tools. Super Sculpey is a specialised oven-bake polymer clay, often used in the manufacturing of toys, jewellery, and figurines and can be cast in a variety of materials. In this course, you will learn how to sculpt with this high-quality product. You will also learn how to build a tinfoil and wire base ('armature'), which will reinforce the structure of your creation, so it may survive the distance.

16 years+ Introduction to flower printing in Mokuhanga:Japanese Woodcut Weekend Workshop

Saturday 16th December & Sunday 17th December

10am-3pm



All materials included; tools provided by the tutor.

In this weekend workshop, students learn about the history and techniques of mokuhanga. This printing method has a long history in Japan and is best known for the Edo period ukiyo-e prints. The process uses water-based inks and is executed with a handheld baren instead of a printing press. In this introductory workshop, participants work with partly pre-cut plates and learn the particulars of carving and printing Japanese woodblock prints on Japanese kozo (mulberry) paper (often referred to as "rice paper"). Suitable for participants with a basic understanding of relief printmaking and an interest in Japanese arts and crafts. You can bring your designs (to be discussed with the tutor); simple designs will be available.

Sybille is an experienced Art Tutor teaching at the WSA since 2010. She has studied Japanese printmaking with Master Carvers and Printers in Australia, Germany and Japan since 2016; her work has been exhibited and is held in collections in Aotearoa, New Zealand, Australia, Europe and Japan. She is currently working towards her Master of Visual at Auckland University of Technology with a focus on printmaking.

Teen Creative Writing Class

Congratulations to Leo Reid, Geneva Bydder and Ruby-Mei Mason!

In term 2 2023, Anya's 12-17 year old creative writing class embarked on a mission to enter various competitions. Students were able to choose which competitions to enter (provided they were eligible) and what format they wanted to write in. It was a successful term, and each student produced beautiful works of poetry and/or short fiction. Among the students, Leo Reid placed second in the prestigious Sargeson Prize for their short story 'Triptych'. Their story 'A Borrowed Interest' was also published in Re-Draft, a literary magazine for teenage writers. Geneva Bydder came second place in the poetry category for the Out On The Shelves Creative Writing Competition with the poem 'Be ready to go by the time the bell rings'. And Ruby-Mei Mason came second place in the Out On The Shelves short story section with the short story 'Soulful Flora'. Ruby-Mei's story also placed second in the StyleFit Short Story Competition. The creative writing class is a fantastic group of talented young people and is often referred to by students as the "underground social club".





Art work by the boys of Mazoe School


One of my roles at this Mission School for boys was to take art with the 3rd & 4th formers. The yearly budget was \$300. So it was down to crayons, cheap paper, powder paints or those cakes in trays and some scrubby brushes. I tried to show some of their traditional art of the past, but they saw that as a huge laugh. They loved colour and did wonderful patterns with paint and crayon over the top. Their landscapes had some really quaint perspectives too.
















Impressions of Africa by Haydn (6)

One of my star pupils was Japhet who had a natural gift for Art. In class he did this outstanding copy of Jacob van Ruysdael's scene with a windmill (1628 ~ 1682) It was something that Japhet would have never seen. Also the fact that he only had powder paint cakes to work with makes it even more remarkable!

I tutored him on saturday mornings for a while using oil paints. We had to stop because the other boys were jealous and threatened to beat him up if he continued.





Later he wrote me a letter calling me "Father... please take me with you back to New Zealand..." Which of course we could not do. These are possibly the first pictures Japhat ever painted. I encouraged him to paint something of his home and this is what he came up with. One is a moonlight scene – powder paint on black paper. The other is an oil on oil paper.
