

Matariki signals the Māori New Year. It is a time of renewal and celebration in New Zealand that begins with the rising of the Matariki star cluster.



The two meanings of Matariki both refer to stars: mata ariki (eyes of god) and mata riki (little eyes).

When is Matariki?

Matariki is a star cluster which appears in the night sky during mid-winter. According to the Maramataka, Māori lunar calendar the reappearance of Matariki brings the old lunar year to a close and marks the beginning of the new year. Hence, Matariki is associated with the Māori New Year.

WSA History

We thought it would be nice to put little excerpts into our monthly newsletter about the history of the WSA. The excerpt below is from 'Moves Afoot - A supplementary history of the WSA 1983-2009' by Megan Lyon

The Waikato Society of Arts (WSA) has been a significant part of Hamilton's cultural, historical and community make-up since it's inception on 14th August 1934. This was the result of a public meeting convened by two Hamilton artists, Ida Carey and Adeline Younghusband and Dr 'Tim' Rogers, who believed the 'arts should be the heart of life of every town, as a vehicle for the expression of humanity and morality'.



Part 8: WSA School of Art

The prime directives of the WSA Art School are teaching and increasing the awareness of art in the Waikato region.

The school is mandated to provide tuition to students of all ages and abilities with tutors being practising artists themselves. The students have varying reasons for their study, from purely recreational to honing their skills in preparation for formal qualifications in tertiary institutions. There is a large range of media covered by the WSA Art School including woodcuts, pastels, painting and drawing to name but a few. The school has been important in its own right and has been a means of encouraging membership to the WSA and vice versa.

It has also had an important role in keeping WSA members invigorated by teaching and learning. For example Joan Fear a WSA artist, member since 1965, and patron, says of her teaching 'you learn something different everyday I suppose'. Anne Kalnins has had some 20 years of involvement and is a pivotal figure in the WSA School of Art. The school remained at The Studio Gallery for some time after the gallery shifted. It then moved on to Ward Park, in the old Ministry of Works depot opposite Girls High School, until the move to Artspost in 1998 where it consists of 2 general studios and a print studio.



Attention Printmakers!

WAIPRINT 2021, the annual exhibition by the printmakers of the WSA, is 10 September—11 October, so time to start thinking about what prints you'll submit. The entry form is included in this newsletter.

Our guest artist this year is our own Gemma Reid, who tutors several classes in the WSA Art School. In 'Points of Viewing' her collagraphs examine the unique quality of light found in Aotearoa and how the interplay of light and shadow reveal the rich architecture of the Waikato region.

'Print Outside the Box', Gemma's WAIPRINT workshop, will involve pushing print into three dimensions and will be suitable for both experienced printmakers and total newbies. Learn how to make a collagraph or drypoint print and then transform it into a free-standing object. This is a two-day workshop, 18 and 19 September.

Waiprint 2021

Gemma Reid - WSA Tutor

Originally from Auckland Gemma Reid completed a BFA in Printmaking at Elam School of Fine Arts. Having lived overseas for 20 years, Gemma returned to Aotearoa in 2019 and settled with her family in Kirikiriroa. Primarily working as a printmaker, Gemma has a particular interest in intaglio methods. This print practice is augmented by a variety of creative methods. Working overseas, without access to a print studio, this experience resulted in the exploration and development of a working practice using intaglio methods that are achievable without a traditional studio set up.

Reintroduced to the clear light peculiar to Aotearoa, Gemma's printmaking takes her strong drawing practice on a journey to further develop particular elements of her environment. Allowing the light to flatten space results in dynamic and stimulating compositions with a strong emphasis on pattern informed by the architectures of the Waikato.



About Printmaking

Printmaking is a process-based art form, carving a board, inking it up and finally the magic of pulling a print. Well, if the print matches your expectation. But even if it needs correction it just means that the anticipation of the perfect print is delayed.

Being process-based means that there are many decisions to be made in the creation of a print. The first step is the concept and then selecting the method, the clean-cut lines of a screen-print or the "noise" from carving marks on a woodcut? Or perhaps the intricacy of the design in an etching?


Ink and paper both need consideration. Carefully adjusting the press and then the magic.

Hamilton is fortunate to have a facility for teaching printmaking and even more fortunate to have tutors that can teach a variety of printmaking methods. Classes are run by Waikato Society of Arts in the basement of the ArtsPost building.







Three cheers for Women Painters 7 Berthe Morisot (1841 ~ 1895)

In recent years Berthe has been re-appraised as not just the "feminine impressionist with a light touch" but at the cutting edge who was bold enough to explore the colour of light and take it to another level. In this way she was a leader and should be recognized as such.

Berthe was fortunate to have come from a wealthy background, with encouragement from her parents to pursue her chosen career. Her boldness is revealed in several ways. First it was unusual for a




Harbor at Cherbourg, 1871




