NZPPA 2020

Congratulations to this year's NZPPA winners. The five winning works were from a record 408 entries. Below are the works selected by Judge Julia Waite. The Gordon Harris Peoples Choice Award Winner is on the next page.



The substantial main prize of \$20,000 sponsored by the Philip Vela Family Trust, (our major sponsors for the past twenty years) was awarded to Aucklandbased painter, Reece King, for the work Good Socks. Upon looking at the painting, Waite was reminded of painting giants - American-Canadian painter Philip Guston as well as Colin McCahon. "Good Socks straddles abstraction and figuration, inviting viewers into the artist's psyche by way of the back of his head... The black spots evoke small parcels of information entering King's memoryboard-brain and the work unites a sense of body and brain together.


But I keep coming back to those big feet at the base of the painting. The socked-feet evoke a sense of rootedness, reminding us to put one foot in front of the other."

The Brian Perry Charitable Trust Award in Painting (\$2,000) went to Auckland-based painter Laura Williams for the work Seclusion: The Realisation. The vivid painting depicting a couple in bed caught the eye of the judge: "Through pattern, colour and rich detail, Williams elevates our expectations of what an everyday bedroom scene might look like. In her Garden of Eden, the walls are covered in paintings from history and the imagination and open up new lines of thinking about history, paradise and landscapes of the heart."





Print Council Aotearoa New Zealand Award in Printmaking (\$1,000) went to Lauren Drescher for the work Venus Family. Waite wrote on the work "The characters... appear like a totemic network each with powers to guide us through these strange and unsettling times...Drescher has successfully translated her influences and made a cast which feel entirely fresh and new."

The Wintec Media Arts Award in Painting (\$1,000) went to the Waikato-based painter, Nadia Gush, for the work Waikato River (near Kirikiriroa). The modestly scaled oil painting on canvas, which depicts the Waikato river running through farmland, was selected by the judge due to its ability to 'move' the viewer with its heaviness and "...put paint to important cultural work" in reference to the environmental effects of farming.

NZPPA - Gordon Harris Peoples Choice Award Winner



Congratulations to Rachel Hope Peary for taking the Gordon Harris Peoples Choice Award with her work *An Invitational Space*.

Peary wrote on her work for the award "My curiosity lies in the in-between, underneath or behind, the seen and unseen. This work seeks to make the invisible visible and plays with figure ground relationships in an unconventional way. It holds space for protection of the delicate and for the moments that are veiled and concealed."



WSA History

We thought it would be nice to put little excerpts into our monthly newsletter about the history of the WSA. The excerpt below is from 'Moves Afoot - A supplementary history of the WSA 1983-2009' by Megan Lyon

The Waikato Society of Arts (WSA) has been a significant part of Hamilton's cultural, historical and community make-up since it's inception on 14th August 1934. This was the result of a public meeting convened by two Hamilton artists, Ida Carey and Adeline Younghusband and Dr 'Tim' Rogers, who believed the 'arts should be the heart of life of every town, as a vehicle for the expression of humanity and morality'.



Continuing on from the 2nd instalment which regarded the period when the WSA moved to Artpost building around 1983.....

Robin Cuff, WSA President at this time, stated 'I really feel this is the start of a new phase of our growth. I think it should provide the stimulus for a stronger society. It will be a good thing for us and the community.' Campbell Smith also recalls that it was 'more of a city gallery and probably a bit more glamorous.' The decision to move had not been taken lightly by the WSA and a special meeting had been called on 22 June 1983 wherein there were three options to choose from. These were 'to move completely to the Hamilton Arts Centre, which would involve substantial commitment of Society Funds, to leave the classrooms at Anglesea Street and move the gallery to the centre, or to stay at the Studio Gallery.' The outcome was to move the gallery itself, however the school of art remained at the Studio Gallery where there was now space for another classroom. As it was deemed necessary to have a permanent staff member on site a new position of tutor/administrator was created in 1984.

Back to the Hall for the auction from 6.50 - 7.00pm.


The Main Event:

Which of course in our little group we could see many different tones of pinks, yellows, oranges, browns as well as shadow colours. Finally our hair shape and colours. Haydn's Artyfacts


Leonardo's unfinished symphony 1 Adoration of the Magi

(96" x 97") Oil on wooden panel

In 1481 some Monks in Florence asked 29 year old Leonardo to paint them a Christmas scene. It was a commission to paint "The Adoration of the Magi" the story of the three wise men coming to visit baby Jesus. Simple enough you would have thought. They gave him two years with a six month extension. Plenty of time. They asked the wrong artist. Was not going to happen. Perfectionist Leonardo, with his mind teaming with ideas started to fill his space with a multitude of details with ancient meanings.



Lord Kenneth Clark suggests that Leonardo would need another life time to complete this project. Fortunately for us artists the layers of the onion are laid bare to reveal the mystery of Leonardo's planning and technique. There is the spare drawing, then first glazes on some figures. While others are nearing completion. There are at least 6 or 7 horses in the background, some with riders! A fanciful architectural structure rises up on the horizon and standing tall just to the right is a tree of the Carob family – it's seeds were a unit of measurement used to weigh precious Jewels. Precious stones to be set in a crown for one born to be King! Thus a gift from nature. Just behind that tree, is a Palm tree symbolic of the triumph of Martyrdom. A King born to die.




Haydn's Artyfacts

Leonardo's unfinished symphony 2 Adoration of the Magi

(96" x 97") Oil on wooden panel

Leonardo employs a strong pyramidal structure to anchor the picture. From the Virgin turning to lookdown at Balthazar being blessed by Jesus is one continuous line of movement. The other two wise men – Casper bowing low, and Melchior gazing up form the left side of the pyramid.

Echoing this pyramid is the building structure upperright thought to be the ruins of King David's Palace.



There is a full blown battle scene planned for the background. Possibly to represent the chaos of the pagan world interrupted by the arrival of the Peacemaker. The Battle scene also illustrates a time when the three Kings were mortal enemies. But on their journey following the star, they had time to sort out their differences and made peace with each other.







A recent cleaning of the work has revealed that quite a bit of the painting was by another hand. It was removed so that just the young Leonardo's work remained. He continued to reshape and change ideas as he worked.

Tutor News

Susannah Salter - WSA Oil Painting & Life Painting Tutor

Local artist Susannah Salter received a boost to her career this month when her design proposal was accepted and she was invited to exhibit her work at the well known Kaipara Coast Sculpture Gardens in November. The work will be on show for a year. 'Woman of the World' is a two metre high sculpture of the female form, created in fired ceramic, found objects, wire and steel. She stands, both Mother Earth and Papatūānuku, age-old and all powerful, surveying this world, with one foot in another. The concept was born out of the collective Covid 19 experience and witnessing the world flourish without pollution and also a desire to see strong female statues reclaim the landscape.





Susannah is a full-time painter and potter, who teaches painting and pottery in Hamilton and surrounds. She enjoys sculpting and the firing process, which brings extra life and texture to her work. She is a graduate of Wimbledon School of Art in London, where she did a degree in Costume Design. This is her first large scale sculpture. Susannah regularly takes part in group exhibitions in Hamilton and her next painting exhibition this year will be with with Gaye Jurisich at Bustle in Hamilton from 28 November 2020 in their exhibition, Susannah's website 2VIFWS www.susannahsalter.com. "OUR SANCTUARY" NANCY TSCHETNER – EXPRESSIONS IN SAND

A new solo exhibition from artist Nancy Tschetner combines over 40 shades of New Zealand and international sand to create exciting individual pieces. Based in Hamilton, Nancy Tschetner is renowned for her ability to take a kaleidoscope of the natural colours found in sand and generate detailed and mesmerising works.

Her latest exhibition 'Our Sanctuary' opens on Saturday 7th of Novemer, 10.30 am, at The Wallace Gallery, Morrinsville and shows a variety of works representing nature in its purest form.

"With my work I aim to connect, not only people with people, but also people with nature, "Tschetner says.

"Gradually, each grain becomes part of a larger image, represented in my artwork. Just like us, when we come together and stand together, we are stronger and can achieve greater things." To highlight certain colours or details not available in sand, she uses crushed glass, leave gold or other mixed media.

In a world where there is a growing move towards sustainability, Tschetner's work uses nature's own resources to provide a connection between the audience and mother nature.

Her portfolio includes sand portraits. The portraits are outstanding and bring to life that special person or beloved pet.

The variety of colours and the complexity of each grain of sand allows Tschetner to capture every distinctive element of her subject, freezing in time the fleeting magic of a place or a particular memory.

Nancy says" In my sand paintings and portraits I have pursued the simplistic and effective results that can be attained through contrast with the natural coloured sand of Aotearoa offering ideal texture and the contrast I was after"
