Our Annual General Meeting will be held on Wednesday, September 16th at 4pm in the Print studio, at the back of the Artspost building. All welcome to attend. If you are interested in the direction of the Waikato Society of Arts, then please come along and hear what has happened in the past year from a governance perspective and what plans are ahead for us.

If you value the Artspost and WSA space, which provides free exhibitions and openings every month, an art school to over one thousand students of all ages per year and is a permanent destination point when people are in the CBD, then show your support for us and the artists who tutor, exhibit in this beautiful space and sell their work. There are few free indoor public spaces in Kirikiriroa, Hamilton that provide such a joy to walk into and where the community and tourists can spend time appreciating the incredible New Zealand handcrafts, artwork and exhibitions we have on display. As a not-for-profit organisation we rely on sponsors and donations to keep this for everyone to enjoy. We run three National Awards for artists as young as 13 upwards, providing a platform and level of experience and exposure many artists participate in. This can involve schools, teachers, parents, artists of all ages and varying mediums coming together to celebrate and respect the incredible talent we have in our country, all for the public to enjoy. The annual Members Exhibition opened on Friday night, September 27th. What a crowd! It was so great to see such support for the artists who had worked hard to showcase their work, with 117 works on display. Come along and enjoy the variety of mediums exhibited, something may tempt you. Alongside this is the beautiful printmaker Sue Roots with her intricate print works, it is such a pleasure to be able to host this. Treat yourself and take some time out to stroll through the galleries and enjoy both these exhibitions, there is so much to take in.

The New Zealand Painting and Printmaking Award is now open, this has been moved forward to previous years to align with the Hamilton Garden Arts Festival, in February 2025. This is a great opportunity to have your work seen by over ten thousand people coming through the finalist's exhibition, and your work judged by experts in these two mediums. This is also a great opportunity if you wish to be part of the sponsors who give over \$26000 worth of prizes to New Zealand artists in Painting or Printmaking to come forward and recognise the importance of supporting this long standing, prestigious award. This is the only National award to offer such a large prize for Printmaking of \$12000. In our 25th year of running this award we have seen artists careers flourish from having this money injected into their practices. The awards will be presented in the Artspost galleries on February 21st.

Thank you to the incredibly loyal team of volunteers we have helping behind the scenes to keep all our spaces working efficiently and tidily. We are always grateful to see you and appreciate everything you do.

#### 2024 Wayzgoose

With encouragement from Graham Judd (who ran the letterpress workshop last year) I attended this year's AHP / ABC (Association of Handcraft Printers / Association of Book Crafts) wayzgoose (see Google for a definition!). It was held in Taranaki, and I had a great time. The main event was a dinner, with a guest speaker who had owned a printing business. He spoke a bit about his background, the future prospects for commercial printers, and about his time as a judge for the Pride in Print Awards - which was very informative, even for those long associated with the printing industry.

What interested me most were visits to two museums, the Taranaki Pioneer Museum just outside Stratford, and the TATATM museum near New Plymouth. Print shops at both of these are maintained by a small group of retired printers, all missing the good old days before computers took over the industry. It was great to talk to them, to learn a bit more about letterpress, and to see a running Linotype machine - casting lines of type (rather than individual letters) from a keyboard.

I didn't get beyond the print rooms, but there was a lot more to see at both of these museums. The Pioneer Museum is bigger and possibly more generally interesting - it has a good cafe (with better toilets), and offers train rides!

The other event that had been organised for the wayzgoose was a look at the Fred Butler collection in the Puke Ariki library archives. Fred Butler was an eccentric Taranaki personality who among other things stuck newspaper clippings into old books, indexed them, and covered them with wallpaper:

The library staff also showed us their older books, kept in locked cases - everything from a map book of county Devon brought to New Zealand by an early settler, to a first edition of 'A Good Keen Man'. There weren't a lot of wayzgoose attendees, and this year they were mostly letterpress enthusiasts. Everyone was very friendly, the older ones wanting to pass on their knowledge and passion for print, the younger ones keen to learn and wanting to share their experiences.

Next years wayzgoose will be held in Auckland, in conjunction with the BIND25 conference (publicised as an "opportunity to network with fellow bookbinders, book artists, printers, conservators, librarians, calligraphers ..."). It should be a larger event with a different flavour, and will be a little closer to home!

#### **Printmakers Social Gathering**

Laughter, sharing ideas and prints being worked on and completed, discussions about what works, recommendations on where to source products, and morning tea were all part of the second social gathering for printmakers from the greater Waikato held recently in the WSA printing rooms.





Work shared included a book made at last year's PCANZ (Print Council) summer school, printing on tea bags (and a source for supply of tea bag paper), some impressive reduction block work, a 3-D printer and work from the Open Press Project Print Exchange, and a recommendation for "Sketchbook revival." There was also mention of new WSA print classes for term 4, the upcoming PCANZ Summer School workshops to be held in Hamilton, and a print exhibition at the Taupo Museum that's on until 28th October. Ideas suggested for future gatherings included studio tours, short PowerPoint presentations of ideas, or demonstrations of techniques.


The next gathering is planned for 9th November, 10am until midday, at the WSA print rooms.
